### MESSAGE FROM BOARDMEMBERS

he 2016-2017 school year was a year of changes. With an entirely new Board of Directors, the Student Association of George Brown College (SAGBC) was set to take the organization into a new direction where transparency and accountability were key focuses, followed closely by a desire to increase the engagement of our membership and empower our members to make change.

Over the summer of 2016, the Student Association spent most of its time focusing on training the new Board and integrating them with the staff of the organization to ensure everyone was working together in harmony. Of course, we spent much of the summer planning the events for the school year, but a large portion of our time was spent on reworking our budget. For our incredible Community Action Centre, the 2016-2017 term was where we saw great strides being taken towards building more inclusive environments. This was the year that the CAC started introducing testosterone kits into the George Brown College community. It was the 2016-2017 year that the CAC was able to pave the way into making those testosterone kits available and easily accessible for the 2017-2018 year.

During the Fall 2016 semester, the Student Association of George Brown College became a key player in the November 2 National Day of Action. As Ontario is the province with the highest tuition fees in Canada, it is no surprise that this was a highly important event. Organized by the Canadian Federation of Students, after passing the vote in the June 2016 National General Meeting, many of the Toronto Action Coalition meetings were held in SAGBC spaces! We hosted students from across the GTA so that we could plan for the Day of Action. On November 2, 2017, over 100 GBC students gathered at the St. James Campus and were provided with a bus at the rally meet-up point on the Ryerson University campus where we marched to Queens Park and rallied to "Fight the Fees". That rally sparked key conversations with folks like the Minister of Advanced Education and Special Skills, Deb Matthews, and the Premier of Ontario, Kathleen Wynne.

The 2016-2017 year was a wonderful learning experience for us as a Board of Directors. We not only worked to teach our members about important topics like consent culture, trans\* inclusion, gender-based violence, anti-islamophobia, and Black Lives Matter, but we also brought our students together and built a true community. From our over 120 part-time student staff members, to our 60+ clubs, the SAGBC truly strives for inclusion of all of its members.

### STUDENT ASSOCIATION FEES

### THE SA RECEIVES A SMALL PORTION OF THE FEES AT THE COLLEGE, WHICH IS SPENT TO OFFER VARIOUS SERVICES TO STUDENTS:

#### SA OPERATING FEE:

This fee is used to operate many services and departments in the SA including events, clubs, food banks, Community Action Centre, campaigns, academic advocacy and The Dialog.

#### SA BUILDING FEE:

The SA helped to build the Casa Loma Student Centre in order to provide students with a place to eat and relax. A portion of this fee is also used to pay off the existing mortgage and maintain the facility.

#### SA CONTINGENCY FEE:
